Our Ministry

Catholic Healthcare West hospitals are technologically advanced without losing the human touch. At St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital we foster the belief that people make the difference in the art of healing. We strive to create a professional and healing environment that respects human dignity, provides excellent services, promotes justice in serving the poor, stewards our healthcare resources and collaborates among healthcare providers and community leaders. We believe that high quality healthcare is a right, not a privilege, and we strive to provide healthcare access for all who seek care in our facility.



History and Heritage

St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital, nestled near the foothills of Camarillo, was founded in 1974 by a group of community leaders who believed that a hospital was needed in that community. In addition to its 81 acute-care beds, St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital has a 99-bed extended care unit and the only hyperbaric medicine unit in western Ventura County.

Improving Community Health

Our affiliated physicians, employees and volunteers recognize and support the physical, emotional, social and spiritual well being of those we serve.



We aim to provide the highest quality healthcare within our hospital walls, but we also work in partnership with other local organizations to address the priority health needs of our community outside the walls of the hospital.

We hold ourselves accountable to our community for the human, financial and ecological resources entrusted to our care. We are proud to share this 2008 Report to the Community on the strategic efforts we have undertaken over the last year to promote the health of the St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital community.

Community Benefit Programs

In FY2008, St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital provided \$15,069,834 in unsponsored care and programs for the benefit of our community. Unsponsored care includes costs of care for persons who are poor, the costs associated with caring for Medicare, Medicaid and other government program beneficiaries, and costs for services our hospital subsidizes because they are not offered anywhere else in the community. The remaining community benefit expenses may also include health professions' education and research, clinic services, health promotion and disease prevention programs, grants and donations of cash or services to non-profit organizations.



Highlights of St. John's educational and direct healthcare community benefit activities in 2008 include the following:

St. John's Collaborative Community Benefit Programs

St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital continues to strengthen the partnerships with local agencies who share the vision of our founding Sisters of Mercy. This collaborative approach to address the health needs of the sick and vulnerable in the community ensure that the widest range of innovative health and wellness services are available to all residents, regardless of age, or ethnicity, or financial status. There are over ten on-going

partnerships, such as Camarillo Health Care District, Ventura County area Agency on Aging, Food Share, and ARC of Ventura County.

Payment Assistance Program

This program extends health care services at a reduced price to those community members with incomes up to 500 percent of the federal poverty level who have no means to purchase health insurance

St. John's Healthy Beginnings

This program provides bilingual and bicultural prenatal healthcare services for low-income pregnant women and teens, serving 31 teens, and 330 adult women in 2008.

St. John's Shots for Kids Immunization Program

In 2008, shots for Kids, an immunization program for children 0-18 years, increased the immunization compliance percentage of 645 children, whose immunization cards were assessed, from 53% to 89% compliance, working towards the Healthy People 2010 goal of 90% for Ventura County.

St. John's Braille Institute Partnership program

This collaborative agreement, which began in 2005, provided needed access and vision services for 143 senior community members in 2008.

St. John's Health Ministries

This outreach program provides free clothing assistance, as well as financial, and referral services, weekly food distribution, hot meals, free bus token service, and the very popular Adopt-a-Family/Holiday Thanksgiving, Christmas food, and gift basket campaign. In 2008, the combined efforts of the basic needs programs totaled 35,204 individual contacts and services.

The unsponsored community benefits provided by St. John's during its fiscal year 2008 reflect its mission to deliver compassionate, high-quality, affordable healthcare services, to provide direct services to our sisters and brothers who are in need, and to advocate on their behalf, and to partner with others in the community to improve the quality of life.

Community Grants

The CHW Community Grants program, which is funded by contributions from its member hospitals, is one way in which CHW supports and enhances the advocacy, social justice and healthier communities' efforts of its hospitals and religious sponsors. One of the program's objectives is to partner with other nonprofit organizations that share our values and also work to improve the health status and quality of life of the communities we serve.



Last year St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital & St. John's Regional Medical Center contributed \$123,579 in grant funding to 9 nonprofit organizations serving our community. Grant awards were offered to the following organizations:

Boys & Girls Club- Camarillo
Get Healthy Program is an after school fitness, nutrition and education program that will address the negative effects of alcohol, tobacco and drug abuse by promoting healthy eating habits, and increase physical activity

Boys & Girls Club- Oxnard/Port Hueneme
The Shape program for youth ages 6-18 aims to decrease the risks associated with obesity among all youth, but specifically those from low-income families in Oxnard and Port Hueneme, through an integrated approach that includes nutritional education and physical activity.

Community Action of Ventura County

The Senior Home Modification and Safety Program is a community based program which will provide 100 low-income seniors residing in Ventura County, services that would promote healthy and safe homes for this vulnerable population.

Food Share of Ventura County

This program provides healthy after-school snacks to twelve sites throughout the county. Sites such as the Boys and Girls Clubs and PALS sites serve snacks to approximately 1700 children each week. Food Share enlists the help of over 600 Volunteers annually to feed those in need.

Interface Children Family Services

CRP coordinates access to no-cost healthcare for uninsured or underinsured ill, injured, or otherwise in need children by matching them with professionals in the community willing to donate the necessary assessment and treatment.

RAIN Communities, Inc.

This program aims to establish and promote life-long healthy eating lifestyles as well as housing for homeless families, children and single adults.

Rescue Mission Alliance

This program assists 450 homeless women and/or women with children-- 55% adults and 45% children-- 5% Asian, 3%Black or African American, 35% Hispanic or Latino and 57% White or Caucasian—with housing, support and recovery services.

The Salvation Army- Oxnard/Port Hueneme Corps Center

This program serves indigent, uninsured residents in Oxnard and surrounding cities in Ventura County. The majority of clients are from migrant, seasonal-worker households of Hispanic origin.

Turning Point Foundation

The Ventura County Homeless healthcare Project provides each homeless client with a basic physical, health, mental health, alcohol and substance health assessment.

Community Investments, Ecology and Advocacy

Community Investments



CHW's Community Investment Program provides below market interest rate loans to nonprofit organizations working to improve the health and quality of life in their communities. CHW borrowers develop affordable housing for low-income families and seniors, provide job training for unemployed or underemployed persons and create wealth in low-income and minority neighborhoods.

Since 1990 Catholic Healthcare West has invested over \$96.9 million in community based nonprofit organizations.

Ecology Initiatives

In January 1996 the CHW Board of Directors endorsed the Ceres Principles for environmental stewardship. In endorsing the Ceres Principles, CHW agreed to conduct an internal environmental audit and complete an annual public report



on environmental performance. This action positioned CHW as a healthcare leader on environmental issues. At CHW we develop and implement policies for the reuse, recycling and conservation of Earth's resources.

Advocacy Efforts

Through effective advocacy efforts, CHW addresses the social, political and economic structures that impact the health of persons, especially those most vulnerable. Our advocacy priorities address issues related to: providing the resources needed to effectively care for those most vulnerable; promoting community health; and advancing ecological initiatives. CHW collaborates with other organizations that share our values to coordinate public policy and shareholder advocacy efforts.

Catholic Healthcare West, headquartered in San Francisco, is a system of 41 hospitals and medical centers in California, Arizona and Nevada. The CHW network of more than 9,700 physicians and approximately 44,851 employees provides quality health care services during more than four million patient visits annually.
